aniel Is Our "Little Whirlwind"

Hi, we are Rick and Stacey Gasper and our second adoption story began about four years ago when we decided to search for another child. We already had a wonderful son Eric, who we had adopted from Korea when he was 6 months old. By now he was about 4 and stating often he dreamed of having a little brother.

Needless to say, this pulled at our hearts. However, recently my husband's business had hit a really slow period and this did not seem to be the time to be thinking of bringing another child into our lives. On the other hand, Eric kept insisting and he was not getting any younger. We really felt it was important for brothers to be fairly close in age.

"Now or never"

We also believed our family was not yet complete, so it was now or never! My parents ('Mimi' and 'Popi', to the boys!) graciously offered to help us with the costs and we will be forever thankful. We truly wanted our sons to share the joy of having one another. So our journey began.

We attended a Welcome House Social Services information meeting where we met Jane Kramer and we listened to all the countries requirements. We were disappointed to learn it was unlikely to find a child about 3 years in age from Korea. All the children coming out of Korea were within 4-8 months old and there was a waiting list until the following year.

At the end of the meeting, Jane approached us with pictures of "waiting children" and gave us general information about them. We learned that a waiting child is one that is ready for placement, with some sort of special need.

Sung Kook and Brittany's Hope

Jane drew our attention to this one little boy, Sung Kook Choi, and told us about a wonderful organization named "Brittany's Hope" that helps special needs children find loving homes. It turned out Brittany's Hope was sponsoring Sung Kook Choi with a grant to help a family

bring him home. Someone else cared about Sung Kook enough to advocate for him!

Going home with heavy hearts

We went home with heavy hearts and piles of paperwork. We were not sure if we could handle the emotional and financial demands of a special needs child. What if this child needed extensive medical treatment? We were not in a position financially to juggle medical bills. We had never really considered a special needs child, and were a bit afraid of what this might mean.

We're Spreading The Message

Dear Friends,

Brittany's Hope is growing and the word is spreading. The more people we talk to, you talk to, and they talk to, the more and more people hear the message.

When Candy Abel spoke at a function, a special person was touched enough to spread the word... which led to a benefit concert that raised over \$10,000.

The planning efforts for the benefit concert led to a Drexel University professor creating a DVD about Brittany's Hope, which we will use as an aid for fund raising. The DVD, filmed and duplicated at a cost of approximately \$12,000 to \$15,000 was given to us free because Drexel University heard our message.

We showed the movie about Brittany's Hope at the benefit concert. A family who was moved by the message in it is now pursuing an adoption.

Last year, I bought a beautiful music box from Al and Linda Loughry of the Grande Place in Kitchen Kettle Village, Intercourse, PA. While I was purchasing it, I told the story of Brittany's Hope to the Loughrys and invited them to the Christmas Home Tour. Eleven months later, they came to the Home Tour and met with Candy and I. They were so moved by the story of Brittany's Hope that they offered to raffle off a \$15,000 music box and donate all of the money to the Foundation. Wow!

As I walked through the airport with my newly adopted daughter Tianna, a couple approached

me to talk about our adoption experience. Already considering adding to their family by adopting, they later called to meet with us. They went on to adopt two children through an affiliate agency, and the wife became a Brittany's Hope board member.

I continued to read the reports of waiting children over and over again. Sung Kook's paper kept appearing at the top of the pile and I was drawn to him. I received additional information and medical examination reports. They said he had a motor development disorder and he had been receiving physical therapy.

When he was born, the doctors did not see any problem with his health, so he had been matched with a family in the US for adoption. At about 4 months old, he developed some problems and cerebral palsy was mentioned. The family who had been matched with Sung Kook must have gotten scared and refused the referral. So he went on with his therapy and went through all kinds of tests. Sung Kook was not gaining weight and was failing to thrive; it seemed to us as if he was just pining for the love of his forever family.

Meant to be ours forever

It was time for us to search our souls. We felt a connection with this baby and began to believe we could handle whatever was to be, as long as Sung Kook was home with us. Rick and I realized with the financial help from "Mimi and Popi", and the grant from Brittany's Hope, we would be in a better position for any medical expenses that may be coming with this little guy. Somehow we felt this was the road we were meant to take. Our Daniel Sung Gasper (Eric named his brother) was waiting for us... meant to be ours forever!

Now came the hard part... the wait... we wanted him home right away! We ran into a few delays, and he did not come home as soon as we had anticipated. He was almost 18 months when he arrived home on March 14, 2002. We were so overjoyed! Eric was so very excited, and he could not wait to hold his new brother! To our amazement Daniel's health is just fine! He walks, runs, and climbs, just perfectly. He is our little whirlwind and never gives up! He has the kindest loving heart and a buggerish way about him! He loves to find trouble, and when he knows he is busted, he will walk up to you innocently and give you a big hug!

Daniel is thriving and blossoming every day in our loving family. We thank all of the wonderful people at Brittany's Hope Foundation and his Mimi and Popi who helped make our family complete with the adoption of Daniel! We will be forever grateful for this precious gift from God!



She brushes her teeth, dresses, and goes to the restroom herself. She loves to sing, and recites many poems by heart. Grant: \$6,600.00.

Asia 04 – This cute 10-year-old girl has some deformities of the hands and a teratoma on her left eye, but is otherwise healthy. Her caregivers say that this does not stop this kind little girl. She helps with the cleaning, dishes, loves to recite poems, and can read in Chinese. Her grant is \$6,600.00.

Asia 06 – This sweet, round-faced 7-year-old girl is kind and gets along well with her caregivers and the other children. She loves to paint, has a good imagination, is smart and has good language abilities. She was treated for Hepatitis B, but is healthy today. Her grant is \$5,000.00.

A Healthy Heart for an Angel

Little Pham Hoang Ngan is the picture of health these days. On the day that I visited with her adoptive parents and brothers, Ngan spent much of her time in cheerful play at our feet. Her sweet voice and happy spirit filled the tiny house in Vietnam as Mr. and Mrs. Pham and I shared tea and polite chatter. Looking at Ngan, I could not believe that this was the same child who was fighting for her life only 5 months prior to our visit!

Mr. and Mrs. Pham were faced with a difficult situation on September 1, 2000, when Mrs. Pham's sister died during childbirth leaving infant Ngan with no one to care for her. Even though they had two boys of their own to care for, the Phams decided to adopt Ngan and move from Cao Bang to Ho Chi Minh City in search of a better life. In 2002, Ngan was diagnosed with a heart condition and in April of 2003, the family was informed that it was essential for Ngan to have surgery at the only Heart Institute in Ho Chi Minh City. The cost for the surgery would be \$2,000, which needed to be paid in advance for Ngan to be placed on the waiting list. And even if they had the money, the wait for the surgery would be about 6 months due to the 6,000 other patients also waiting, most of whom were children. Dr. Alain Carpentier, a French doctor and the founder of The Heart Institute is proud of its 95% success rate and relatively low fees, however very few families living in Vietnam have the resources to afford such an expensive medical procedure. The Pham's resources as well as those of their extended family were depleted and they did not know where to turn

to get the funding they needed to save their daughter's life.

While they were struggling with this dilemma, they met Joy Degenhardt from MAPS, an affiliate agency with Brittany's Hope Foundation, and an organization which has been helping Vietnamese children and poor families for over 10 years. As part of their humanitarian aid program, MAPS has in the past provided funds for heart surgery, however due to the current hold on adoptions in Vietnam, there were no funds available. Recognizing the urgent need, Joy contacted Brittany's Hope Foundation and after reviewing the documentation, the board members unanimously agreed we would answer the call and provide the funds needed by this deserving and loving family. The Phams had helped little Ngan when she had no one, and now it was our turn to help the Phams. Our simple gift put her on the list and eventually provided her with lifesaving surgery on December 26, 2003.

In May of 2004, I had the opportunity to visit with Ngan and her family. I felt so honored to spend time with this wonderful family. I was impressed by the love and devotion they expressed to the beautiful daughter they have adopted. As I watched this sweet cherub play, my heart swelled with the knowledge Brittany's Hope had made a difference in the life of this beautiful child. With God's grace and the love of her family, Ngan will continue to develop into a strong, healthy little girl and live the childhood she would have been denied without surgery. Heaven will have to wait a little longer for this angel!

"Karina, You Are My Best Friend."

Looking at us you see what most people do \sim a happy, healthy, loving family. If you were to meet us at the park, out to dinner or at church you would perhaps smile at the sight of two young parents with two beautiful, energetic little girls. Yet things were not always this way. There was a time quite recently when we were not a family. Today I invite you to take a glimpse into our lives as I share our family story and the crucial role Brittany's Hope Foundation played in its formation.

Our names are Korey and Kristen Kandel. After several years of marriage we discovered that our family would be one formed through adoption. After much research we decided to adopt internationally from a former Soviet Union country called Kazakhstan. Our greatest dreams were realized in May 2001 when we adopted our I year-old daughter, Mia from Kostanai, Kazakhstan.

Our experience in Kazakhstan was fantastic

We spent nearly one month in country fulfilling the required visitation period and filing necessary paperwork. Upon returning home we met and formed close friendships with many other families who had adopted children from Kazakhstan. It was through these families that we would hear about the child who would become our second daughter, Karina.

Karina's journey to us began back in February 2002 when a family who were in Kazakhstan adopting two children asked about special needs children available for adoption. Their translator, Elena immediately took them to her favorite child, Karina, whom she feared would never have a family because she was born without the lower portion of her right arm. Karina was represented by an adoption agency, MAPS International for some time, MAPS was unable to find an adoptive family for this otherwise healthy child. The Daniel's family visited with Karina and were troubled to learn that she was a very sad, lonely little girl. Armed with a video and pictures of Karina, the family returned to the US and set about telling anyone who would listen the story of a girl who needed a family.

We could not stop thinking about Karina

Korey & I were touched by Karina's story and we carefully considered if we could adopt We knew of the prejudice that existed in the former Soviet Union toward not only orphans but also the handicapped. Karina was both of these and her future was very bleak if she remained in Kazakhstan. Despite our concerns for Karina the negatives (and excuses) for not adopting Karina were all there. Most importantly we had not recovered financially from the expenses of Mia's adoption just a year previously. Even with all the valid concerns, we could not stop thinking about Karina. Common sense told us to just drop the issue and move on. As a Christian couple we knew that God's greatest concern was for the fatherless and we felt Him urging us to simply pursue Karina's adoption and see where it would lead. We wanted to be obedient but we could not avoid the most important detail – financially we could not afford the adoption fees.

Could this adoption really happen?

Having completed our first daughter Mia's adoption through MAPS International Adoption

Agency, I felt comfortable calling the agency and casually inquiring about Karina. I spoke to Libby Walch, the Kazakhstan program coordinator and shared our desire and concerns with her. It was then that Libby told me Karina had been submitted to Brittany's Hope for financial assistance. My heart nearly leaped out of my chest at this news! Could this adoption actually happen? The Brittany's Hope grant solved our greatest need and we decided to move forward towards adopting Karina.

In July 2003, we made our first of two trips to Kazakhstan to adopt Karina. It was quite an eve opening experience. Our impressions of life in an orphanage were based on Mia's adoption as an infant in a baby home. This time we were seeing the life of 3, 4 and 5 year olds. We were not prepared for the range of emotions that we were experiencing. We spent 3 weeks with Karina visiting and officially adopting her in a court. This time allowed us to fully experience the situation Karina was living in. Although the orphanage gives the children what they can, it is certainly not enough. The children are provided the basics of life, but never enough food and attention to fill them fully. Our visit was bittersweet. While on one hand we were supposed to be experiencing overwhelming joy at meeting our daughter, we couldn't reconcile that with our intense feelings of sadness, helplessness and anger at the unfair life of the children in the orphanage. During my stay I came to the realization that the best way to help orphaned children is to get them out of the orphanage into families. This is the work of Brittany's Hope!

A visit to an orphanage has a deep and life changing impact on your heart.

As many families who travel to orphanages overseas can attest to, a visit to an orphanage has a deep and life changing impact on your heart. We not only form a bond with the child

we take home, but also with children we leave behind. I have met many families who want to adopt, but decide against it once they hear the high cost. It seems like such a waste when I think of the waiting children we left behind and realize the only thing standing between them and a family is money.



It is now 10 months since our trip to Kazakhstan and Karina is home! She is a beloved daughter, sister, granddaughter, niece and friend. Karina is now glowing with happiness and health. The child that was once angry and never smiled is now open, affectionate and never without a smile on her face. She can count, tell us what sounds animals make, speak small sentences and is a quick learner. Our concerns about her disability were without merit — she functions beautifully. Karina has grown to accept and love herself. She proudly shows her arm to curious children with an attitude of "this is me, this is what I look like".

Life has changed

Perhaps the most wonderful development is the relationship between sisters, Karina and Mia. Their relationship is beautiful, sweet and caring. They are 3-year-old sisters who genuinely enjoy having each other. Karina gives Mia hugs and kisses and is always sure to get an extra sticker or candy for her sister when one is offered to her. I recently overheard Mia say, "Karina, you are my best friend". Life over the past year has certainly changed for little Karina!

A family fills the deepest desire

We have absolutely no doubt in our mind that without the help of Brittany's Hope Foundation Karina would not be here with us today. The generosity of those who give to Brittany's Hope offered Karina this chance at a family. A family fills the deepest desire that Karina had. Sowmya Shines With Self-Confidence

When I was fourteen years old my parents adopted my sister Beulah from India. She has Down syndrome, and I was not sure if I was going to like her or not. She arrived 3 days before Christmas. She was very shy, wouldn't talk to anyone, and took all of my mother's attention. The first time she smiled was on Christmas morning, when one of my brothers was being silly with a new gift.

Since that time I have come to love Beulah very much. Because of her Down syndrome she is not very advanced mentally, but she had the most loving heart of anyone I have ever met. She is so sweet and fits into my large family wonderfully. Because of this great experience, I hoped that one day I would be blessed with an adoptive child of my own.

We knew we wanted to adopt at least one child

Before my husband and I got married, I told him that I really wanted to adopt children as well as having them biologically. About five years and two biological children later we decided to start looking for available children to adopt. We just knew that our family wasn't going to be complete until we had adopted at least one child.





Her disability didn't matter to us

Two days after Christmas in 2002 while we were visiting my family in Albuquerque. New Mexico, they received a pamphlet from the adoption agency that they had adopted my sister from with pictures of waiting children. My husband Mark and I each looked at the pamphlet at separate times that day, and each had felt a bond with the beautiful little girl born with no arms. We knew that we wanted her to be part of our family. Her disability didn't matter to us, we just knew that she was supposed to be our daughter.

Concerned about the costs

We knew that international adoptions could be very expensive and we were trying to figure out how to pay for it. Mark was getting a bonus from his job and we calculated that it would cover about half of the adoption expenses. We were concerned that we would have to take out a substantial loan to cover the remaining costs.

When we called to inquire about how to get started, the agency told us that there was a grant helping to pay for this particular child's adoption. The grant from Brittany's Hope was courtesy of a private sponsor, Colonial Craft Kitchens in Annville, PA, owned by Jerry and Linda Hoffsmith, and would enable us to pay for all of our expenses without going into debt. If we had to pay for all of

our adoption costs. would have gone debt over \$8,000.00. We are a one-income family and on Mark's salary we would have heen paying off that loan at \$180 a month for the next five years. That would have left very little for actually feeding and clothing an extra child. As you can see, the grant money not

only helped my family avoid debt, but it freed up enough money monthly to actually care for our new child.

A year and a half later, Sowmya came home

It took a year and a half to finish all of our paperwork and await government approval before we could bring our daughter Sowmya home. Sowmya is from India (just like my little sister). India's culture is 30% unemployed and homeless. To make matters worse, people with any disability are automatic outcasts in their society. Our daughter would have ended up on the streets, probably begging with no hope of a future or a family.

She has something she never had before: self-confidence

Now that she is in our country, she has a family who loves her and she can have whatever kind of future she desires. When I first brought her home she had no self-esteem. In the orphanage they treated her like she wasn't capable of doing anything on her own. She didn't want to do anything herself, because she had been raised to believe that she couldn't. Now it is 4 months later and she can do nearly everything our biological children can continued on page 15

do. She feeds herself, has wonderful manners, potties and bathes herself she has something she had never had before: self-confidence.

Two weeks ago she got her first prosthetic arm. She says it is "very pretty" and you can see in the way she carries herself that she thinks she is pretty now. We are so proud of Sowmya and are looking forward to seeing what she does with her future and newfound independence.

Sowmya is a very loving child. She loves to give us hugs and say "I love you" all of the time. She loves to talk and sing and play with her brother and sister. Today she even helped her little sister put on her shoes. She doesn't let her lack of arms impair her. You should she her eat French fries! She can even dip them into ketchup and turn them around to put in her mouth ketchup side first without getting any on herself.

What a different child she is now

She loves pretty things. She always gets excited on Sunday morning when we let her pick out her own dress for church. What a different child she is now! When I went to India to get her, she lived in a tiny, dirty little room with 10 other children. She wasn't potty trained, and had never fed or dressed herself. She has never even been outside of the orphanage. In fact, the first time she played in our yard, she was scared of the grass! Now she laughs and runs, rides a bike, and loves to play soccer.

We are so blessed

We are so blessed to have Sowmya in our family. We love her just as much as our biological children, she is our child. We are so thankful to Brittany's Hope for helping us to pay for all of the countless expenses that accumulate during adoptions. Thanks to Brittany's Hope our family is complete, happy, and free of debt!

We look at adoption as a very sacred exchange. It was not done lightly on either side. I would dedicate my life to this child.
