Likewise, their adoptive families display heroic efforts as they jump through Olympian-size hurdles of paperwork, costs, governmental regulations and ultimately medical treatments.

All done in materials that Alek can feel. He loves outerspace and wants to be an astronaut. He spends his days building legos, listening and singing to music and playing on his computer that talks to him.

ebecca's passion for orphans started when she was 12 years old. After babysitting children in her church who were adopted, she was changed forever. "I lay in bed that night and couldn't sleep. I felt God's calling - this is what you're supposed to do." Since that night 24 years ago, she has always had a special place in her heart for orphans and adoption. Rebecca and her husband, Tom, now have three children adopted from Russia in 2003 - Sasha 13, Andre 11, and Rosa 10, who were recipients of a grant from Brittany's Hope.

When they were married, Rebecca and Tom asked their wedding guests to donate to a ministry in lieu of gifts, of which Brittany's Hope was one of them. Brittany's Hope was the proud recipient of \$1,250 from their guests! Her dream was to eventually raise the entire \$10,000 to pay back the grant awarded to her children so they would be able to help another special needs child to be adopted. The question was "how to do it?" Garage sales, bake sales and jewelry shows, while wonderful fundraisers, just weren't going to get it done. Instead, Rebecca started a four year training program for her first Half Ironman Triathlon (1.2 mile swim, 56 mile bike, 13.1 mile run = 70.3 miles).

On July 10, 2010, Rebecca ran and completed her triathlon - an amazing and incredible personal accomplishment; and in doing so, raised \$9,655 for Brittany's Hope, enough to place a grant on a sibling group of five children from the Philippines, who will soon be united with their forever family!

The cycle of giving has been continued! Rebecca raised an entire grant for a sibling group from the Phillippines and offered the adoptive family, who lived in the same state, her help in getting situated. Rebecca called race day "one of the happiest days of my life. I enjoyed every minute and finished in 6 hours 39 minutes." Congratulations, Rebecca!


Rebecca says, "Adoption isn't the signing of papers or promises made in court. Adoption is choosing to love a child - a picture of what God does to us. God didn't adopt us because we were cute, healthy, talented or had a lot to offer. He chose to adopt us because He loved us. He knew that through His care and power, we could become what He planned for us to be. I chose to love Sasha, Andre and Rosa when I stood before a Russian judge in May 2003. Tom chose to love Sasha, Andre and Rosa when he stood before a Grand Rapids wedding congregation in March 2007. Has the road been difficult? Yes! Has the journey been full of God's blessings? A hundred times YES!"



We, at Brittany's Hope, are so very proud of Rebecca - as a loving wife an adoptive mother to three wonderful children, an athlete, and for her dedication to helping other children be united with their forever families. Rebecca is currently training to run her first Full Ironman on May 21, 2011. Her fundraising goal is to raise another \$10,000 for Brittany's Hope, towards grants for more children waiting to come home.

Lenna wrote to her parents:



a knack for art. She gets plenty of time to catch up with her favorites, Hannah Montana and Taylor Swift as she heals. Her parents and eight siblings are overjoyed to have her as part of their family.



## One Spoonful at a Time

"Suprisingly, Bakha's biggest challenges have been tiny. Her major disability at adoption turned out to be malnutrition. With a better diet, vitamins and a couple of years of therapies, she completely caught up to her peers."

Bakha is a healthy, happy and bright 3rd grader. She's easy-going and loving. She loves riding horses, hanging out with friends and reading anything she can get her hands on. She's in Brownies and 4-H.

Bakha was adopted in 2006 at the age of 5 years. She suffered from an undiagnosed case of rickets. Her posture was hunched and she walked little and poorly, with much pain. She was mistakenly thought to have an untreatable, degenerative condition and was weeks away from being transferred to a "special needs orphanage." Within days of adoption, her mother Mishelle suspected rickets and began giving her a vitamin supplement. She started walking, and then running, within weeks. She grew 8 inches in her first year home.

Bakha has been a big inspiration to her mother and the many people who ended up meeting her. Because of Bakha's challenges with malnutrition, Mishelle co-founded the SPOON Foundation, which was established to help prevent such deficiencies for other children living in institutions overseas. Where are they now?



## Our Orphan Care Village Opens It's Doors

The planning for this center began three years ago on our first trip to Ethiopia. We heard of the need from the people who live and work in this area of Ethiopia. With no organization providing a safe place for the abandoned children, we worked quickly to respond to the need.

This was the first full scale construction that Brittany's Hope has undertaken. We experienced the usual delays and complications but the work is done. The plans for the Orphan Care Center are based on the family

model with a trained caretaker living with a group of children. We are working with an Australian organization based in Ethiopia, the Grace Centre, to train the caretakers. We have received our license and are preparing for children.


Wevisited Ethiopia to see the completed center. They had an inauguration of the



center with local officials, churches and the people who made this possible. Everyone was very excited to see the center completed. The government of Injibara and the Awi zone were supportive and helpful during this process.

We have completed the protective fence, guard house, 4 children's houses, kitchen and caretaker's residence. This is only phase one of our long term plans but is now ready to house 20 – 40 children.
