I am elated, as Brittany's Mother, to see so many people rally around a mission of family and unity. To celebrate with them as we witness the 1,000th time an orphan becomes a cherished member of a family. This is truly a momentous occasion and it is a tribute to your passion for bestowing love on children in need.

Brittany's Hope began with the desire of a young woman who was once lost herself, to find homes for other lost children. Most of you know the story of Brittany and how her passing became a catalyst that helped unite so many beautiful children with loving families. At the time, I struggled to understand the senseless death of a young life.

However, one of the blessings of time is retrospection. As a child, I sat on my mother's lap and listened to her personal orphan story; a story that began with a mother's death at her birth and continued on with the death

of an adoptive mother. My mother moved from family to family, never truly belonging. She overcame her loss and became the kind of mother upon which children grow, dream, and create.

God used her story in His wisdom to mold me for adoption.

What was a tragedy became a burning desire to adopt in my heart. That desire would bring Brittany to us, and consequently, create forever families across the country. Seventeen years later, I have witnessed so many miracles that I now see only the legacy of love rather than the loss.

A new adoptive mother recently presented her child to me and said with a smile, "Now I understand why I had to go through all the infertility... so I could be her mother." In the pages before you, you will meet many of these amazing children, from some of our early placements to newer families. They all once started from a place of loss.

I was born into a poor family. My mother is deaf and mute and my grandparents are old and weak. I came into this world without a father figure in my life. Because of my family situation, the House of Love has become my home for the past six years. I have a good life here, but I still long to have a family.

I want very badly to have a father to love and guide me through life. It would be a dream come true to have a father and a family to run to like many other kids my age. Being at school has been a privilege, but it also hurts my heart every time I see my friends getting out of school, throwing themselves into their parents' embrace. It is in those moments I feel the most alone and isolated.

I know I am luckier than many others to be at House of Love; however, at night I still dream of one day having a family. In my dreams I get to experience the love of a family, where we gather over a meal and chat with each other about school, about work, or what's on the TV news headlines. When I wake up, the warm feeling quickly disappears and all I have left is my hope that my dream will one day come true.

Although I haven't gotten to know you, or see you in person yet, I know you are out there. I will continue to pray until the day you come for me. It will be a special day, because I will get to say those sacred words — "Mom & Dad", have fun with my siblings, and fulfill my dream of a family that I had been longing for.


Mary Rose shared, "Brittany's Hope is an important part of our daily lives and truly helps to provide the framework of our greater goal of enriching the children's lives."

Our House of Love located in Cam Ranh, Viet Nam, is a peaceful, safe community surrounded by rice patties and mountains, serving as a home to over 93 children. Even with its unique beauty, this particular region is known for its flooding and its most recent disaster is by far the worse this area has ever seen.
