

Father George Grima Speaks of Tragedies and Miracles

After 13 Years in Ethiopia, Father George Asks Brittany's Hope Foundation to Build an Orphan Care Village

On a cool November evening, Brittany's Hope hosted a gathering to hear Father George Grima speak about his years spent ministering to the needs of impoverished people. His stories, some horrifying and others uplifting, moved the guests in the audience to both tears and laughter.

Speaking in English heavily accented with his native Italian, Father George mentioned the upcoming Thanksgiving holiday. "If you would not make one or two of the dishes you put out with your turkey, you could save that money and send it to Brittany's Hope so that hungry children can eat."

He spoke of poverty-stricken people living in cemeteries, families sleeping huddled under umbrellas.

He told of parents asking for lumber to build coffins to bury children dead from starvation. He said, "The father told me he did not want to bury his son's body wrapped in banana leaves, so I gave him what lumber I could find."

the homeless.

Father George is particularly concerned about the well-being of children. When children are arrested and jailed for crimes such as stealing food or glue-sniffing, Father George pays the fees to free them. He offers them a place to stay at one of his shelters, feeds them, and gives them a chance to change their lives.

Education is a rare luxury for poor children. Father George encourages villages to construct a small classroom, then pays a teacher to instruct the children. He is proud

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of the kindergartens he has set up in leper colonies, so that the children there have the opportunity to learn.

In his travels through Ethiopia, Father George has found people who are as concerned about children as he is. He recounted a story of finding an infant abandoned in a trash pile. He was able to find enough milk to feed the starving baby for a short time, but cans of milk in Ethiopia cost \$7 to \$9 each. Friends of Father George fasted for a week to save money to buy cans of milk to feed the baby until more could be found.

After he finished speaking, a guest approached Father George with a check for several thousand dollars. It was more than enough to finish a well that had been started, but he had run out of funds to complete it. The next day, Father George received a message that a child had fallen into the unfinished well. "Praise Jesus," Father George said, "with this money, we will finish the well so that no more children will fall in."

In the weeks that followed, more generous donors stepped forward to contribute to the Orphan Care Village. With their help, construction is moving forward. Together with our supporters and Father George, Brittany's Hope anticipates a time when orphans in Injibara will be free of poverty, hunger, and hopelessness.

ORPHAN CARE VILLAGE:

Construction Update

Phase I of the Orphan Care Village construction began in September 2008. Originally slated to begin in July, excavation was delayed by an unusually stormy rain season. For three months, rain poured down on Injibara. Dirt, hard-packed from months of dry weather, became deep mud. When the rain finally cleared, backhoes were brought in to begin excavating the site.

After the excavation was complete, workers used cement, sand, gravel, and stone to lay the foundations for the children's homes. Soon concrete block was in place, and electrical wiring was laid out.

Father Abebe Teklemariam is in charge of overseeing the Orphan Care Village's construction. Because he issues regular reports about the progress, Brittany's Hope is able to follow developments as they occur.

In January 2009, David Abel and a few other Brittany's Hope representatives will travel to Ethiopia to inspect the construction site. They will also visit areas in Kenya and Tanzania to view possible future projects or orphanages.

Construction on Phase I of the Orphan Care Village is expected to be complete by May 2009.

Phase I at The Orphan Care Village at Injibara will include Children's Rooms, a Sisters' Residence for the nuns who will act as caretakers, a Priests' Residence, and a playground. Sanitary facilities will include a dry latrine, clean water plant, and laundry facility. A guard house at the front gate and fencing around the perimeter will enable security for the campus.

Inside the buildings, we will build bedrooms, classrooms, and offices. A separate building will contain a kitchen area and a common dining room. Flush toilets, sinks, and showers will be part of the clean water plant.

The exterior of the village will feature landscaping with trees and shrubs. A section of land will be set aside for fruit-bearing trees and a garden area to grow food to help make the project self-sustainable.

Phase II will include a medical clinic with examining rooms, hospital rooms, offices and secure storage for medical supplies. A worship facility will serve the entire surrounding community. Outbuildings will house livestock such as cattle, chickens, and goats.

Phase III will include a guest house with bathroom facilities and a common meeting area. Also planned are additional dorm rooms and classrooms to house and educate more children.

Phase IV will include a vocational center to teach trades such as sewing, carpentry, and machine work. A soccer field is also planned.

We Stand In Awe of the Details Our Heavenly Father's Hands!

When our daughter Whitney was asked to describe adoption, she used the metaphor of beef stew. "You see, when you add another ingredient (child) it takes a while to get used to the new flavor. Each one of my siblings added new spice to our family. Zoë added sweetness, Wyatt added spiciness and Zion added a little bit of sweet and sour. But it's our family and it was made by God!" stated our 15 year old daughter. My husband Scott and I have been married almost eighteen years and have five amazing children.

In 2006 we were praying about adding a fourth child to our family through our local Department of Child Services, and hadn't considered overseas adoption. We have fostered over fifty medically fragile children and adopted our sweet Zoë through foster care. We contacted Bethany Christian services to inquire about a special needs child in their magazine and told them that the finances would be an issue for us.

Two days later we received an email from Janie Van Dyke about Erikas (now Wyatt) from Eastern Europe. She said he had a grant from Brittany's Hope, and his adoption fees were reduced!

We had no clue where Lithuania is - we had to look at a map to find out where our son was! Six months later, we were in Lithuania with our son running into my arms saying, "mamita! mamita! (mama, mama)."

In 2008 God placed on our hearts the desire to adopt another child and we were looking at our local foster care adoption program. Oh, God has a sense of humor and his plans are much greater than our own! I was looking at the waiting children list at Holt International. My husband reminded me that we were going to pursue a "local" adoption, and we were "not" going overseas again!

I told my husband I was praying for the children and that I would look at just one more child. I clicked on a child that had a Brittany's Hope grant. To our amazement, this little boy had one finger on each hand and one toe on each foot. Our son Wyatt (Erikas) from Lithuania was born with one finger on each hand and two toes on each foot! Scott agreed that we should pray for him. Later Scott said he felt God intervening immediately in his heart. Two days later I found my husband on

his knees, in total surrender to God's plan for us to adopt from China.

Zion's adoption process took eight months. So in October 2008 we headed to Fujian, China to bring Zion home! On our flight home from China I was wondering if a two year old could even notice that his big brother Wyatt had the same hands as he did... That was the first thing Zion noticed as we greeted the kids at the airport! Zion reached out his finger and touched his big brother's finger! It was so amazing to see how God created these two boys to be brothers and how there was an instant connection!

It is amazing to look back on the past two and a half years with Wyatt. He is full of life and is growing in many ways. It has not been an easy journey

at times. Wyatt learned in the orphanage to be very self-reliant in meeting his needs. When Wyatt first came home he did not know how to express his feelings, and any time he hurt or felt overwhelmed he would withdraw. After being home for six months he totally shut down. After three trips to the pediatrician in five days, we finally found out what was going on after he was admitted to the hospital with a ruptured appendix. God opened our eyes wider from that point on. To this day we work with Wyatt in communicating basic needs. With love and the security of a safe environment, we see a child learning to cry out when he needs to.

Zion has been home for three months. Zion grieved for the first few days away from the orphanage while we were still in China and had many temper tantrums during the first month. Still, it seems that Zion has had the easiest adjustment coming into our family. He is an extrovert and loves to be around others. He wants to do everything Wyatt and his other siblings are doing.

I wanted to share from my heart about our adoptions. Adopting children who are older or have special needs brings challenges as well as blessings. God is now directing us to adopt one more child and we have learned to trust God in His leading. We are very thankful for our two teenagers and their love and support in adopting children with special needs. I am thankful for my husband and all that he does for our family. He is the most caring, talented, funny and loving husband, father, and pediatric nurse! I would encourage anyone praying about adopting children with special needs to seek out friends who are like minded. I have the BEST supportive friends that pray, cry, laugh and love me and our family. Our family wants to share God's love and passion for orphans around the world.
